"Filthy Lucre," an immersive interior by painter Darren Waterston, reimagines James McNeill Whistler's famed Peacock Room, a sumptuous 19th-century dining room and icon of American art, as a magnificent ruin, literally overburdened with its own materials, creativity and tortured history. Opening at the Sackler Gallery, the room is the centerpiece of "Peacock Room REMIX," an exhibition that probes the dramatic and occasionally unresolved tensions between art and money, ego and patronage, and the Peacock Room's own exquisite beauty and contentious past. "Peacock Room REMIX" offers visitors the only chance to experience Waterston's creation alongside Whistler's original Peacock Room, a permanent showpiece of the adjacent Freer Gallery of Art.
